
Sandown Primary School and Nursery Pupil Premium Spending Plan 2022/2023

Pupil Premium is additional funding so that schools can support particular groups of pupils who are known to be at risk of under achievement and aim to close the attainment gap between these pupils and their peers	The quality of teaching and learning at Sandown must be consistently good or outstanding in order for our Disadvantaged Pupils from lower starting points to achieve and close the gap with their non-disadvantaged peers. We recognise that a consistent approach to improving teaching and learning, a TRG (teacher research group) approach and opportunity for staff to receive support from subject leaders is key. Through employing HLTAs, we are able to facilitate consistent class cover teaching using in-house staff. This ensures consistency for the children. HLTAs also run Booster group sessions in Year 6 and overlearning across the school.	At Sandown we ensure that our pupils are exposed to a rich and varied curriculum with wider opportunities in the Arts and sport. We subsidise music lessons for eligible pupils to enable them to learn an instrument if they wish.	Our Early Years Nurture provision is a short term intervention to support vulnerable pupils with a range of needs to ensure successful transition into KS1 and beyond. There is afocus on Speech and Language and communication.	We employ a member of staff to ensure our wrap around care offers quality provision for our most vulnerable pupils. This alsohas an impact on attendance and building relationships with families.	To ensure our Disadvantaged Pupils are punctual and have eaten breakfast, we offer short term places in Breakfast Club. Occasionally we provide uniform, PE kit orshoes where necessary.	At times it is necessary to call upon a SaLT NHS for assessment and detailed support programs. Baseline entry data shows that speech and language support is key to our pupil's progress and outcomes.

TAs with a focus onpupils eligible for pupil premium will ensure that our most vulnerable families succeed.	Having identified the potential barriers to attainment for our pupils as being linked to attendance, persistent absence of key pupils and limited aspiration among some of our local community, we employ a dedicated Parent Support Adviser to support families. The role is to liaise and work effectively with the family, school and other professionals to promote the wellbeing of the children at Sandown. It involves offering advice and signposting the family on how to access a range of appropriate services	We spend a proportion of our Pupil Premium on a range of resources across wider agencies to support our assessment and approaches to understanding the complex needs of key pupils.	The biggest barrier to our pupils learning is the very low level of speech and language that the majority of our pupils start school with. We invest in this heavily, particularly in Early Years as we know that early Intervention is the key to success. Pupils that cannot speak clearly and confidently using full sentences have ongoing difficulties in all areas of learning. We employ 2 Speech and Language TAs and have NHS input from a qualified Speech Therapist for 2 days a week.	Pupils need to attend in order to learn and achieve. Attendance is a key barrier at Sandown and in order to monitor this and make positive impact on our persistent absence, we have employed a dedicated Attendance Officer. This role is pivotal in monitoring families, challenging poor attendance and liaising with school staff and other agencies to provide support. Parental Engagement is key in maintaining a positive school experience for our pupils.
